The meeting was held in person and virtually via Zoom

Call to Order by Moderator Jay Goodman: 11:25

Approval of January 22, 2023, Annual Meeting Minutes: A motion to accept the minutes from the Annual Meeting was made by Kay Galloway and seconded by Pete McVay. The motion passed unanimously.

Election of Officers and Team Members: - Presented by Jay Goodman, Moderator

- Thank you to everyone who has served on a team or as an officer this past year. Everyone's dedication and hard work are much appreciated.
- The slate of officers and team members for 2024 was presented. There is currently one opening on the Congregational Engagement Team.
- There were no additional nominations from the floor. Jay Goodwin recommended that anyone who is interested speak to Sue Cunningham. . .
- A motion was made by Gwen Grotenhuis and seconded by Ann Williams to accept the slate. The motion passed unanimously.

Pastor's Report – Presented by Pastor Jim Thomas

- Refer to the Report of the Pastor in the Annual report.
- 2023 has been an exciting year.
- Continued to do minor tweaks to worship services.
- 4th Sunday is traditional music Sunday.
- Ann Chalk continues to play the organ when she is available.
- 3rd Sunday of the month is special music Sunday.
- Deacons do great on handling the tech desk.
- In 2023 there were 779 connections to Livestream. They came from 39 states and 13 countries.
- YouTube had over a thousand views. Our reach extends far beyond the sanctuary.
- Sabbatical time for recharging, some retreat work, reading, attended the UCC General Synod. Thank you!
- Community presence Chaplain for the Atkinson Police Dept. and the Atkinson Veterans Group, asked to be Chaplain of the Atkinson Fire Dept. in 2024, Director of the Lions Club
- Pres and chair of Board of Director of NH UCC Conference.
- Staff- pretty stable, Jane Goodwin retired as Bell Choir Director. Carol Boudreau is Bell Choir new director.
- Second Sunday in Feb. acknowledge Jane's contribution for 35 years.

• This year's plans – Gratitude Revealed, planning for Spring Festival May 11th, working with Common Ground, focus on gratitude, bringing more folks into the life of the church and grow in our personal faith.

Operating Budget: - Presented by Hank Riehl, Treasurer

- Performed close to how we budgeted, \$50,000 loss.
- It cost what it costs to run the church.
- We need to improve the revenue picture Increase pledges and donor base.
- The annual losses we sustain are using up our savings and investments. We have \$158,000 in our pocket right now.
- Pledging performance declined.
- Looking at next year,
 - 2024 budget shows similar somewhat smaller loss of \$46,000
 - Lynn Thomas's salary decreasing from 4 day/wk. @ 20 hour to 3 day/wk. @15 hours.
 - Solar power reducing energy expenses but have not had it long enough to know how a full year would look.
 - Missions Team 2023 budget was 10% of the previous year's budget equaling \$17,056 – team offered to go with half that amount and reduce it to 5% just for 2024. Need to vote on that.
 - Motion made to accept reducing the percentage of the previous year's budget that goes to the Missions Budget to 5%.
 Passed unanimously.
 - Landscaping Hank will be donating a rider mower to the church., Jay will cut the grass and Hank will help. This will mean savings of \$3500 – \$4000. We will need a team of people to join Jay and Hank to do the landscaping. We will continue paying for spring and fall clean-up.
 - A motion was made and seconded to accept the Treasurers report and the proposed budget. Unanimously accepted.
- Darlene wanted to thank Hank and Cheryl for putting the Budget details in a format that is easy to understand and for everything they do.

New Business:

Nothing that has not been already discussed.

Report of the Pastor for Calendar Year 2024

2024 was the year that many of our missions and initiatives really took off or took root. Our activities as a community of faith, outreach to local communities, and direct mission support all reached new highs. In addition, worship attendance is up, our music program is thriving, and Kids Club has its highest attendance in many years. Let's take a look at some of the highlights:

WORSHIP

Our worship is spirit filled and engaging. A combination of recorded music and a revitalized music program touches our hearts every week. Under the excellent leadership of Carol Boudreau, our Bell Choir is the largest it has been in recent memory and the music has been superb. We continue to welcome Kokopelli Flute Ensemble every month to share their significant musical gifts, and Ann Chalk is a marvel both at the organ and the piano. Kim Ridley continues to work with our kids to sing for us multiple times per year, and we also saw the return of a church choir, singing during the Advent season.

We work hard to ensure that worship is a good experience not just in person, but for those on the livestream as well. The Deacons run the livestream each week, and we receive regular feedback on the quality of our 'virtual' worship.

Our worship attendance increased again in 2024, both in person and online! The reach of our livestream continues to amaze me. In 2024, we had 710 distinctive viewers of our livestream, watching over 4,350 hours of content. Viewers came from 39 different states and 10 countries. Beyond our livestream which is available on the website, our YouTube channel also is a successful portal for people to find us. In 2024 our worship videos had 958 views.

We welcomed four new members in 2024, celebrated 10 Baptisms, and I officiated at 13 memorial services (many of which occurred away from the church).

TEAM ACTIVITIES

In 2024 our Teams became even more active within the church and in our communities, seeking ways to be more 'hands on' and engaged with our time and talent. Please be sure to read the Community Engagement and Congregational Engagement Team's reports for an excellent summary of all the good they are about. The Teams are always looking for additional help to expand what they can do - and it is easy to plug in for a specific thing that calls to you without a long-term commitment.

Three things deserve a special mention.

- In May we held our first annual Spring Festival with vendors, activities for kids, food trucks, touch-a-truck and more. It was a wonderful success which welcomed over 450 people to a fun filled day on our church campus.
- Kids Club is going great! Thanks to Phyllis Hanson, Sue Cunningham, Julianna Hale and Kristen Diamond for living into the hope of a vibrant youth ministry while slowly bringing the hope to life. We now offer Kids Club weekly, with as many as 16 kids attending. What a joy!
- 2024 also saw the return of church suppers and breakfasts, participation in Atkinson Day, the Holiday Drop and Shop event, and much more.

COMMUNITY PRESENCE

Being present in the community is part of the core of my ministry. I continue to serve as the Chaplain to the Atkinson Police Department, Atkinson Fire Department, and the Atkinson Veteran's Group. I am a Director of the Atkinson Lions, and I am present and participating in many town events, including Town Meeting Day, Memorial Day, and Wreaths Across America. I strive to be a community resource, and while much of that work is unseen by most, it does help to reinforce the idea that we consider ourselves a true 'community' church.

BEYOND THE COMMUNITY

I am engaged in the Rockingham Association and New Hampshire Conference of the UCC. In October 2023 I was elected as President and Chair of the Board of Directors for the NH Conference, UCC. It's exciting to help guide and support the 130+ churches of our Conference. I am also part of an area UCC clergy group, and a member of the Hampstead Area Interfaith Community.

STAFF

Lynn Thomas completed five years of service as our office manager, re-entering retirement December 31, 2024. Lynn has been a resource not just to myself, but all of our Teams and groups have relied on her assistance and support. Lynn always had the answers, and we will miss her. We are also grateful to have Kelsey Iani taking over the position in January 2025 and we know she will do a great job.

Bob Hodgdon is a great support as our sexton, caring for our physical plant and completing numerous small projects throughout the year.

Carol Boudreau has recently completed her first year as our Bell Choir Director and things couldn't be better. Our music program has new energy, our Bell Choir has grown in size and complexity of the music performed, and all aspects of our Music Program (Bells, Kokopelli, Ann Chalk at the organ and piano) and choirs work closely together as a team.

Phyllis Hanson is our Kids Club coordinator, working to develop programming for our Kids Club which, beginning in the fall of 2024, happens every week during worship. The recent growth of Kids Club is remarkable, with several families with young children joining our worship over the past year.

New opportunities await us in 2025. Our conversations with Hampstead Congregational Church continue, as we seek to discern whether a future in which the churches share a pastor is the right way for both our communities of faith to continue to thrive. This will be an eventful and exciting year! Let's continue to engage together in ways to make our Light on the Hill shine ever more brightly.

Deacons 2024 Annual Report

2024 was another great year of loyal service. As deacons, we feel hugely rewarded to be part of a "well-oiled machine" when it comes to Sunday services and events. Beyond that, as spiritual leaders of ACC, we're honored to be a helping hand and a shoulder to lean on.

Eight deacons returned to actively serve in 2024. We miss Jane Goodwin, whom we treasure, knowing that she continues to spread immeasurable amounts of optimism and love. We were fortunate to honor Jane in February for a special Sunday celebrating her 35+ years at ACC, highlighted by several music and leadership roles she held. A beautiful quilt was presented to her, hand made by Shirley Reed.

Plus, donations by Kay Galloway and Sue Cunningham to cover costs of tree and leaf removal and additional mulch purchases, as required.
- Thanks to Local Troop 9 Boy Scout Mason Carrubba for choosing to do his Eagle Scout
 community service project at our campus by installing a pollinator area with benches
 and a bird house around the outdoor sanctuary. In addition to the wonderful job, they
 also gave a \$900 check to the check for the money left over from completing the
 project.
- We continue to do our best to keep up with our many gardens, with extensive pruning, weeding, and landscaping efforts. Our goal is to continue to create a serene and inviting atmospheres for all who visit.



Tuthill House Cleanup

Our Church School program is thriving and expanding! Starting in the Fall, classes moved to weekly to accommodate our growing community. To prepare for this enhanced schedule, the team did a thorough clean-up effort. Together, they cleaned and sanitized all the toys, shampooed the carpets, and refreshed the function areas. Their efforts also included painting



both sets of steps and porches, as well as giving the doors a fresh look—a beautiful slate blue, specially chosen by the children.

Spring Fest 2024

The Support Team assisted in various set-up and cleanup activities during this successful event. This included setting up and removing the tables and chairs for attendees purchasing food from the various Food Trucks, cleaning Tuthill House in preparation request for tours by perspective church members.

Rally Sunday

We continued the tradition of leading the cook-out on Rally Sunday. And while the weather did not cooperate, the team still managed to pull together a fantastic indoor luncheon and time of fellowship.

Public Relations - Promotional Materials, Website Support

This year, over 3,500 people visited our website - almost a 20% increase from 2023—and our Facebook posts reached more than 22,000 people. It's clear that our work reaches far beyond our active members, extending our message and programs to the broader community.

Thanks to the dedication and collaboration across all church teams, this year was filled with efforts to prepare for the Lent, Easter, Advent, and Christmas seasons, as well as all our special programming. We created countless community flyers, updated website content, and managed social media to highlight holiday worship services, special church programming (e.g., Spring Fest and church dinners), community events, and fellowship opportunities.

Financials/Team Leadership - Insurance Board Policy

Switch from Church Mutual to Insurance Board for Facilities and Work Comp completed on October 3'2024. Thanks to Jim Thomas for uncovering this UCC service and then Jim Thomas, Cheryl and Hank Riehl for providing all the required info to make the switch and Chet Balut working with the Insurance Board to complete the process. Savings is roughly \$3,000/year.

New Basketball Hoop

One of our non-Church Member neighbors in Atkinson has generously added a brand-new basketball hoop near our existing one, creating a mini court with double the fun! As for the assembly of this hoop, let's just say Chet and Kristen toiled like champions (or maybe mad



scientists), testing their wills and patience to piece it together. But in the end, the hoop stands tall, and both hoops will remain to offer even more playground options for our church and the community. It's a slam dunk for everyone involved—eventually!

These accomplishments were made possible through the hard work and dedication of our Church Support Team members, volunteers,

Faith Formation

It was a successful year for Faith Formation for children and adults. Phyllis Hanson continued as our Kid's Club Coordinator, working closely with Sue Cunningham. The number of kids grew throughout the year. We now have 13 children registered for Kid's Club and Nursery and up to 16 children have attended. We now hold Church School weekly, thanks to many volunteers who have stepped up to make this happen. The weekly curriculum consists of a lesson with videos and interactive Bible stories accompanied by games, activities, crafts and much more! Once a month our kids attend the worship service for a brief time at the beginning of the service, receive a Kids Message and then head over to Kid's Club. We enjoyed their voices again this Christmas time with 13 children participating in our Kid's Choir directed by Kim Ridley. We are grateful for all our church families – old and new.

Pastor Jim has offered adult bible studies this year. This group of about 8-12 folks met weekly during the fall and winter seasons to discuss the previous Sunday's bible readings.















Fellowship/Coffee Hour

Fellowship/Coffee Hour continued to be offered after Sunday Worship. More people are staying after worship for this time of fellowship with friends old and new. We have had many people sign up to host and are thankful for their willingness to help and have been treated to many delicious snacks and goodies. More volunteers are always needed!

Special thanks again go out to Chet Balut who has helped with set up and clean up on a weekly basis and Sue Cunningham who continues to facilitate the weekly volunteer sign-

up sheet – both on-line and in fellowship hall. Sue also orders snacks and supplies as needed plus backfills when there are no volunteers signed up for Fellowship Hour.

Nominating

The 2024 slate of candidates for elected positions on the Teams and Council was approved at the Annual Meeting on January 22, 2024. We thank everyone who served.

Starting in November, the church members, Team/Diaconate chairs, and Council officers were notified that it was time to develop the slate of candidates for 2025. Teams continue to do their own recruiting for any open positions. The Council handles filling any vacancies in the Council's officer positions. Announcements were made in the E-News, and during worship about nominations for the 2025 slate.

We are grateful that all teams and roles have been filled for 2025 and will present the slate at the January 2025 annual meeting. If you have an interest in any of the Team roles or as a Moderator, Clerk or Treasurer for the Church Council, please let Sue Cunningham know.

Music Team

The music program at Atkinson Congregational Church continues to be an important part of our internal and external outreach.

Pastor Jim Thomas picks excellent preludes, postludes, and hymns, and uses AV media to share them with the in-house and at-home congregation. He and Lynn Thomas, the office manager, coordinate this music and any other special music and Lynn keeps us in compliance with licensing and copyright permissions.

We have a core of musicians who provide music on the third Sunday of the month, to include Ann Chalk at the organ and piano, the Atkinson Ringers bell choir, and Kokopelli Flute Ensemble. Kim Ridley has about a dozen children interested in singing with her children's choir, and this is always a treat for the congregation. The Ringers are trying some newer music and incorporating some extended techniques in their music selections, and all ten ringers are enthusiastic about playing every month. Kokopelli really appreciates being included in the church's music ministry; practicing for a monthly performance keeps them on their toes!

A couple of months ago, the music team was approached by church members asking whether it was possible to start up a new choir. We haven't had a choir since COVID-19 made group singing impractical, and the empty choir loft looked so lonely! After much discussion among members of the congregation and the music team, we decided to start a "pop-up choir". This choir would meet once a month, in the morning before service, practice an anthem, and sing it at that service. The reasons for this type of schedule were that not everyone can commit to a weekly practice schedule or singing every Sunday; not everyone can commit to a nine- or tenmonth singing season, and more people CAN commit to a one-and-done practice-and-sing schedule once a month. We sent out a survey with the newsletter and posted a sign-up sheet

in Lovejoy Hall; we had some people express interest, and we contacted them with information about the pop-up choir.

We finally tried the pop-up choir on Sunday, December 23, for the morning service and sang the same songs for the Christmas Concert. We had eleven singers in the morning, with Ann Chalk playing organ and Carol B. directing. It was a lot of fun, and we made a truly joyful noise! There are improvements to be made in the choice of music to sing, and Ann may not always be able to accompany. Carol will ask for help choosing the right music and will endeavor to find music that has recordings that can be heard before rehearsing. This will help the singers to prepare for rehearsal and performance. If Ann can't accompany, we may be able to find pre-recorded accompaniment; Pastor Jim has some ideas for finding that.

We just had our 2024 Christmas Concert with an expanded roster of musicians. Ann Chalk brought us her community ukulele ensemble, and their joy was infectious! Kim Ridley's children's choir was full of Christmas happiness, and Lucy and Stella Southergill enchanted us with their piano solos. The pop-up choir sang two songs, Kokopelli and the bell choir performed, and we had a surprise addition of a contrabass flute solo! Carol's niece, Lindsay, sang "O, Holy Night", Tom Myers and Nancy Hartmann played trumpet along with Ann on the organ, and the congregation of around 120 enjoyed the sing-alongs. Speaking of 120 in the congregation, there were many people from outside the church family that came to our celebration, and we had several mentions on social media. The reception after the concert was made possible by donations of food from the musician, and Chuck and Nancy White and Marisa Galinsky helped decorate and kept the snacks flowing freely.

Going forward into 2025, we can anticipate that Kokopelli and the Atkinson Ringers will continue to play on the third Sunday of each month, and we're going to try to have the pop-up choir play every fourth Sunday. Ann Chalk plays many Sundays, and her music is always excellent and much appreciated.



Community Engagement Team 2024 Annual Report

The severe budget deficit this year has presented significant constraints in carrying out our mission of financially supporting the agencies that care for the homeless and food insecure. But in a good way, it has challenged us to further investigate ways we can reach out to help the community through service. We have continued to attempt to reflect a broader vision of what community engagement means.

We continued our monthly meetings in person. We continue to see significant need in the community for both financial and participatory support.

We were blessed to have a full team of 5. We look forward to engaging more community and congregational members participation in our team activities. We can always use additional members. We always need new ideas and suggestions.

Projects coordinated by CommET this year include:

- Donations of food to St Anne's and St Luke's food pantries continue to be facilitated with the help of Lynn Thomas by placing the shopping cart outside on the porch to allow for drop-offs. We have designated the first Sunday of the month as food donation Sunday. A sign outside reminding people about food pantry Sunday seems to have helped with donations. We have been able to expand to 2 shopping carts that are brought into the sanctuary and we are able to bless the food ready to be delivered.
- Special thanks to Linda Jowett for obtaining the second cart and Marisa Galinsky and Marilyn Moran for continuing to make the deliveries to the St Luke's and St Anne's food pantries about 1-2x per month. We plan to continue this for the foreseeable future.
- After a site visit and tour of Common Ground, we were able to further narrow down what we could do to help. We found they have an ongoing need for travel size toiletries and have established a donation basket. We were able to help meet their need for portable food by making 50 peanut butter, jelly and fluff sandwiches once a month on food Sunday. Thank you to everyone who stays for a few minutes after church to make this happen. A list of other volunteer jobs that they could use help with. is posted in Lovejoy.
- Monthly participation in meal preparation at Sonshine Soup kitchen in Derry has
 continued for drive- thru pick up. We have consistently been able to staff 1-3 people on
 the 4th Wednesdays of the month. Extra effort was given to publicize this volunteer
 opportunity through e-news and announcements in church. Thank you, Michelle, for
 your dedication to this ongoing service.
- A special egg collection was initiated to collect eggs for Easter.75 dozen eggs were donated to St Luke's Food Pantry. Thank you, Marisa.
- We continue with representation on the ONA team.
- We continue with collaboration with Vitality.
- Thank you for continuing to fill the bin for Liberty House and to Kathy for delivering it.
- A blanket drive through CWS allowed us to purchase 50 all-weather blankets that were designated for Common Ground in Haverhill. Pastor Bill attended a service to share his

- mission at Common Ground and participate in the blessing of the blankets. Thank you, Marilyn, Lynn, and Marisa for making this happen.
- A Comfort Station at the town- wide yard sale continued with the appreciation of the community. Bake sales were run during both spring and fall community yard sales. Adding hot dogs was very successful. Money raised in the spring by adding a churchwide yard sale was added to the general fund (\$1925). The fall bake and hotdog sale benefitted Hurricane relief through Church World Services. Community response has been good. Special thank you to all who donated items for the bake and yard sales and worked to make it happen.
- We collected and donated \$700 in cash and gift cards to St Lukes back to school program.
- Christmas presents were collected for the 10 preschool children identified through YMCA preschool in Haverhill. We are thankful for the wonderful congregational response through the sign- up genius. Thank you, Michelle.
- Two Narcotics Anonymous meetings and an AA meeting have been continued. We appreciate their financial donations. Our groups have continued to meet in Lovejoy Hall.
- We were able to support the pancake breakfast and ham and bean supper organized by the Ad Hoc fund- raising group.
- An underwear collection was held for national underwear day in August. The shelters tell us this is one of the most needed items. We were able to take a box of ladies' underwear to the Sonshine clothing closet and a box of men's underwear to Common Ground.
- With the participation of the congregation, 137 welcome notes have been sent to new residents of Atkinson. A sincere thank you to all who have helped with this project.
- We have intentionally underspent the budget for the past several years due to the church budget deficit. We try to replace it with fundraising activities, additional donation requests and direct participation in the community. The needs are endless.
- Something amazing happened this fall. Delivered to church along with the blankets
 were 8 huge boxes full of hygiene packs mostly utilized for disaster victims and by
 homeless shelters. We did not order them and CWS did not want them back due to
 postage costs. Just when we were feeling bad that we had not been able to lend
 financial support to the homeless shelters that we have a long history with, 500 hygiene
 packs were available for us to sort and deliver to Lazarus House, Crossroads House,
 Emmaus House, Liberty House and Common Ground. Thank you to Jay, Julianna,
 Kathy, and Miriam for arranging for deliveries.
- We look forward to increasing our presence in and assistance to the community.

Thank you to everyone who donated and especially those that volunteered. We look forward to increasing participation in programs to follow our vision of caring for those in need.

We would welcome any ideas or suggestions.

Treasurer's Annual Report Commentary: FY 2024

We entered 2024 with an expected budget deficit of \$46,414. Our actual loss was significantly less at \$12,421. This improved performance is mostly attributable to 4 factors:

- 1. A member gave a one-time "extra" gift of \$20,000 (thank you, thank you!!!)
- 2. Fundraiser activities were more plentiful with a net (after expenses) contribution of nearly \$8,000!!
- 3. Improved participation with the Giving Tree; smaller gifts add up!
- 4. Overall expenses were \$7,000 less than budgeted. We are careful spenders.

Overall church operating results are reasonably predictable, though individual items are less easy to predict:


- Income; **Pledges are our best predictor.** We historically collect 98%+/- of committed pledges. We fell down a bit in 2024 collecting only 92% of committed pledges. Less predictable are Non-Pledge donations (funds received from people known to us who did not make a formal pledge) and Loose Offerings (anonymous gifts). Giving Tree and Fundraisers offer great opportunities for additional income, as demonstrated by 2024's great results.
- Expense variability comes from risk items similar to those faced by every homeowner:
 - Energy (oil and electricity) price uncertainty;
 - Unforeseen repairs;
 - Heavy snowfall season;
 - General inflationary impacts.

The **proposed 2025 Operating Budget is being withheld** as of this writing (Jan 9, 2025) to provide more time to improve results from our CY2025 **pledge campaign**. If you have not submitted a pledge, please do so as soon as you can! The final **2025 Operating Budget** will be released after one final effort to receive more pledges in mid-January 2025. It will be made available via email and download before the Annual Meeting.


Two **Timeline Charts** show **Pledge Dollars Received and Pledge Units Received** over time. The Pledge-Year 2025 figures are accurate as of Jan 9, 2025, though we hope to receive more pledges.

The **Year-End Total Cash Timeline Report** shows our TOTAL cash position on Dec 31 for several past years. The decline is mostly explained by our yearly deficits, forcing us to tap into savings. Clearly, this is not a healthy trend. Investment performance (gains and losses) also account for some changes and the slight rise in 2020 was due to our "COVID PPP Loan" being forgiven.
